

What's Involved

Last year we divided the delivery points up between 7 helpers into 7 routes (one mail route) that covered the Bitterroot Valley from Missoula to Lost Trail Pass and Salmon. Points within each route varied from 7 to 18, with an average of 14. We start as soon as the maps are received from the printer, which should be by mid-November. After the first delivery, we try to check monthly to see if replenishment is needed. Each route is provided a log to track map numbers to determine the next year's total map order size and each point's needs. The log also provides contact information with names, phone numbers, email addresses and open times, if any of it would be of help for you. We try to take the hassle out.

President's Message

In spite of the recent warm spell—why do we call them "cold snaps" and "warm spells"; why not "warm snaps?"—the snow is still building up in the mountains. It's looking like a good year for skiing of all sorts. And even though there was an extended period of rain up high, so far there is no sign that we'll have as many trees uprooted and over the trails to cause the grooming crew extra work. Keep your fingers crossed!

We received signs for the new multi-use trails and have placed most of them at the intersections of the new trails. Because there was already too much snow on the Overlook Trail, the remaining five signs will be installed by the grooming crew *(from snowmobiles)* later this month. Similar to the trail signs on the long-established ski trails at Chief Joseph Pass, the new signs should keep people from getting lost.

Although the newer trails will be groomed without tracks and will likely be used by skate skiers most of the time, classic-style skiers are welcome (and expected) to use the multi-use trails, too. In fact, if you like to ski on groomed trails with your dogs, these new routes are perfect. Portions of the new trails will be shared with snowmobiles, but if past years are any indication, don't expect many, especially after December.

You can access the new trails from several points: the parking lot at the corner of Highways 43 and 93 (if you're skiing with dogs, this is the only access), from the north end of Broadway, and along a (newly groomed) trail connecting Windy Corner and the Gibbons Pass Road.

People wishing to reach the new trails from the Chief Joseph Trails parking lot (without dogs), can use Broadway, the CD Trail, or descend directly from the parking lot to Timber then ski around Sentinel Meadow on Solitude to Windy Corner and use the newly groomed connecting trail to Gibbons Pass Road.

The new trail maps will be available soon—they're being printed now. For those of you who may not know, I want to pass on some history and the recent evolution of our trails map to its current form.

A little more than three years ago Jim Greenfield mentioned that it might be nice if our maps were printed in color. Having been a local business owner for many years, he believed color would provide a more beneficial service to those businesses who sponsor the map. We did some research and discovered that, as had once been the case, it was no longer more expensive to print in full color than black and white. So, the map began a transformation to a larger sized, full-color, easier-to-understand product and became THE major fund raiser for our Club.

Jim not only initiated the new map concept, but has been the driving force behind its evolution. Last summer, Jim invested much his of time in an extraordinary effort to learn to use GIS software. Now, because of his dedication, the Club is able to make changes or additions to the map in a timely manner.

Thank you, Jim, for changing the Club's map into an easy-tounderstand product that not only provides our sponsors with an improved "bang for their buck" but now raises more than \$5,000 a year for our Club.

Call to order: Mike Hoyt called the meeting to order at 6:223 PM


Attendees:
